STRATEGIC PLANNING

Pastor Sam Shick provided a report about Spiritual Formation activities. He highlighted these items in addition to his written report.

Shifts in Programs away from LOL (5th and 6th) and JAM (7th 8th) to one middle school youth group (6th to 8th). More consistent group of mentors including 8th graders.

Deaconess Emily McLean has moved to full-time – Women's, Marriage, and Milestone ministries. Much lesser role at the Lutheran Haven. She also has Member Care.

We have sunset programs: Mothers of Preschoolers (MOPS), and Gingerbread Bash.

We are building a Lighthouse Ministry for members kids' College Students for bible study.

Pastor Sam has created modular studies for Explorations – 6 recorded lessons will be available to supplement live sessions for those who can't make it to Wednesday nights. Review the basics of the faith.

Pastor Sam wants to put a Spiritual Formation map so everyone can easily see where they and their children can get involved and see the big picture.

Catalyst leaders are competent – and Pastor Sam will be focused on starting up a few more this year and get more people involved to promote the value of fellowship with other Christians.

Pastor Sam asks for our prayers for the Spiritual Formation programs to come together.

NEW BUSINESS

Approval of Foundation Disbursement

Last year we did not transfer 5% to St. Luke's Lutheran Church due to our financial health. Bryan asked what we'd use the funding for? The foundation recommends that 5% be moved to St. Luke's Lutheran Church. Discussion on what we would do with the funds if transferred. Board elects to not transfer the 5% this year. **MMSA**

Upcoming Retirement of Pastor Arp (March 2, 2025)

Carolyn Duda, Paula Brumback, and Jill Mudge will plan a celebration event to honor Pastor Arp.

Nominating Committee

George is working on compiling a list of nominees for the upcoming Board of Directors election. 2 positions – Michael Begey and Stephen Shaffer positions will need to be filled. George McAllan is eligible to be reelected.

OLD BUSINESS

Master Planning Committee

Doug Taylor will provide an update at the next board meeting.

Slavia Road Status

Trustees approved John Herbert to work on the intersection. Combine five properties we purchased into one. Discussions are on-going about where the driveway will be placed.

16 Acre Land Purchase

Owner came back to us in November to see if we are still interested in purchasing the property. Paula proposed we wait until the Master Planning committee comes back with a plan to determine if we want to make another offer. We are still interested but the price is more than we are willing to pay.

Tom Cotton will consult with a business associate to get another perspective on what the property may be worth. He will report back to the board.

Genesis Project

Strong interest in HS by the parent population. Report on feedback from the congregation will be discussed with the committee this month. Rod Jackson will report results to the Board in March and potentially share with the school family in May in coordination with the Master Planning team.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

Staffing Updates

Pastor Tige recommends we don't pursue any additional staffing until Pastor Sam and Pastor Scott settle in. Church workers are getting fewer and fewer while salaries are going up - well above the synodical pay scale. We will assess staffing needs again later, while focusing on increasing volunteerism at St. Luke's.

Liaison Updates

Paula and George will meet with the Elders regularly. Spiritual Formation check-in in the Spring. Early Summer, Paula and Jeff will talk with Eric Coomer.

Honduras Updates

We exceeded our goal to donate \$110K. Pastors Tige and Scott will visit Honduras in February.

Pastor Coerber

Pastor Scott started this week and is Pastor Roberts old office. His family will be joining him full time after the school year ends.

Audit Frequency

Audit cost has increased 25%. Lisa Prusak is in the process now; it is a full-time effort. The Board needs to decide by April if we want to make a change in the audit frequency. Bryan Doyle will propose language changes to the by-laws for the board to review.

Review of Strategic Plan and 90 Day Objectives

Paula suggests a voluntary gathering in April or May for the board to review the Strategic Plan and 90 Day Objectives again.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Community Connection report by Pastor Scott Coerber.

Pastor Scott is working with Pastor Tige and reviewing existing programs and looking at what is already being done in each area.

Board members expressed support for Pastor Scott and asked how to support Pastor Scott's goals and perspectives, and focused on recruiting, training, and deploying volunteers.

Action item for Pastor Scott: Return in 4-6 months with more details around a Community Connection framework to share with the board

NEW BUSINESS

Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee met to comprise a slate of candidates for Board approval at our April meeting. Currently there are 22 potential candidates for both boards. The final nominations will be approved at the April Board Meeting.

Haven Request

Pastor Tige presented a request for St. Luke's to loan the Lutheran Haven \$385,000 at 4.5% with a balloon payment due in 2 years. This will replace a loan currently held by Fairwinds Credit Union that has a building requirement. **MMSA**

OLD BUSINESS

Master Planning Committee

The RFP for a master planning consultant is back out and we expect to hear from 3 or more companies in a few weeks. Deadline for proposals in three weeks and Doug Taylor will report out at our April meeting.

Genesis Project

Rod Jackson distilled the 45-page report down to a summary for the board. Rod will provide a full report upon email request.

The goal is a gradual expansion plan to accommodate an increased number of students and qualified teachers to preserve the culture.

Preschool Options:

Build new or retrofit existing building, to preserve big tree, and outdoor area by raising floors above flood level (e.g.; renovate vs eliminate.)

K-8 Option:

Build new building for middle school, free-up space in the existing K-8 building to add new grades/classes and other needs.

High School Options:

Strong interest in High School. Families may be leaving before middle school to position them for acceptance into High School (e.g. Master's Academy). One option is to add modular classrooms temporarily.

Board suggested prioritizing efforts in this order:

- 1. Entrance/Slavia Road light/vehicle flow
- 2. K-8 expansion
- 3. Preschool rebuild
- 4. High school

Monies will be raised to build a new school in a capital campaign and increased tuition. We will need someone to come in and design a financial strategy.

16 Acre Land Purchase

Board agrees that there is value and benefit to acquire the property for the future use of St. Luke's church and school.

Board made a motion to work with our negotiating team (Paula, Steve, Mike) to work with our Broker to make an offer on the property, including soil issue and easement issue. **MMSA**

Audit Frequency & Bylaw Changes

Bryan Doyle proposed we adopt a Bylaw change as follows:

5.10.1.2. Oversee the annual audit of the congregation's financial records unless a lesser review, compilation, or no audit is approved by the Board of Directors before or within Q1 of the audit year. Q1 exception is permitted for FY24-25 audit.

5.10.1.3. An annual audit is required at least every 3 years in which the Board of Directors cannot approve a lesser review, compilation, or no audit.

Motion to accept the language as written, with the addition of limiting no audit to no more than 3 years. **MMSA**

This will be proposed at the April Voter's Meeting and approved at the August Voter's Meeting.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

Honduras Updates

Pastor Tige reported that FOROS is maturing to a partnership and working together on initiatives. They now have housing for traveling pastors to stay over. The first 2 baptisms and 8 confirmations have happened on site and one young man is interested in training to be a pastor. Worship at La Paz is packed with young people and kids and noise and there is excitement in the church leadership. Growth!

Horizon Storyline 24-25

Programs are underway (new stage in Founders Hall, new organ for sanctuary, new videos with Pastor Sam for Explorations class, and staff transitions (Pastor Arp, Pastor Roberts, Pastor Coerber, Megan Skelton).

A comprehensive list of programs and analysis tied back to the three strategies will help and identify which ones to strengthen, transition, or discontinue.

Pastor Tige and Pastor Sam have refreshed a lot of spiritual formation programs to align things.

We need to determine the next 90-day objectives by the July meeting to gain buy-in from the new board members. (e.g.; connect people with volunteer opportunities. Generous L.I.F.E, Community Connection)

Pastor Arp Gift

Recommendation that the board recognize Pastor Arp on his retirement. MMSA

Elders

Pastor Tige is now leading the Elders and the board will help and support as needed.

Be! Women's Ministry: Women's Retreat had 140 participants! Remaining plans for the year are a tea party and wine tasting. There are multiple bible studies going simultaneously.

Marriage Retreat: Planned for Nov. 6-9, taking a cruise. One of the pastors and his wife are joining us.

Milestones: Kindergarten had their milestone and blessing event on service. The confirmation retreat had 16 kids in attendance. The First Communion milestone is in April!

Family Confirmation: Family confirmation had their annual confirmation retreat with 12 students in attendance. It was a super special experience for the students to bond and take steps into faith ownership. We completed our spring session of classes, having the group hear lessons from Pastor Tige, Pastor Scott, Pastor Sam, Vicar Eddie and Deaconess Emily. We love that they get to know all of our ministry staff! This May we will confirm 21 students.

GLOW: We had 2 GLOW services this semester so far. The first we heard from Deaconess Alex, she shared her story and walk into ministry and that was a meaningful topic for our students. Each student prayed for a student from word on the street homeless ministries, Rhonda shared a little about her ministry serving them at Christmastime. The next one we did was a Pastor Panel, we had middle school students submit questions and the Pastors answered. They ranged anywhere from, "Lebron James or Michael Jordan?" to "Where did dinosaurs come from?" This showcased the availability of our pastoral staff to our school kids, it was so fun! 3 kids shared testimonies at these two GLOWs:)

School Ministry: Annalisa began teaching the "Young Peacemakers" curriculum in the 6th grade again to build relationships with our middle schoolers. Pastor Sam, Vicar Eddie, and Deaconess Emily, teamed up to teach through the 10 commandments in 8th grade. Pastor Scott spent a week with the 8th grade covering revelation. Continued presence at all chapels and activities keeps us busy interacting with our school families.

VBS: Vacation Bible school registration opened! Karen Jackson is taking the lead role this year alongside Annalisa. We are excited to offer 2 weeks of VBS this year using the Group's curriculum True North. Registration so far has about 250 of 400 spots filled for K-5 VBS and about 65 of 120 for Middle School VBS. We are looking forward to many volunteers coming together to make this another amazing year!

High School Youth: HSY exists to empower young people to lead Christ filled lives. Our High School youth continues to meet and grow. In the Spring semester we have continued to engage around 30 students every week in deep conversations about the faith, and we even got to exercise it. As 15 of our students participated in a clean-up day at Christian Help in February.

Lighthouse College Ministry: Our lighthouse college ministry just kicked off a Bible study for those students who are going to school locally. We are really excited to see how these young people are growing to more fervently pursue Christ on their college campuses.

Faith on Tap: Faith on Tap is planning a get together on April 12th to kick-off their Catalyst group.

Men of St. Luke's: The Men of St. Luke's launched another huddle on Monday nights in January. They had an awesome retreat in January as they continue to guide the Men of St. Luke's into transformative relationships that lead toward lifes of freedom, joy, sacrifice, and renewal.

Explorations: The explorations class finished its spring cycle in March of this year. Pastor Tige led 35 students through the basics of the Christian faith. At the conclusion of this time together 50 new members were received through this class and transfers.

Catalyst Groups: We began the process of launching three new Catalyst groups in conjunction with the end of explorations. We are looking forward to how they will engage some new members and energize some members who have been here.

Generations: Our Generations community continues to grow in depth of relationship and engagement. Our average attendance this quarter has been 230 (15 ahead of last year), and families are engaging in after-service activities and spiritual formation groups with much larger frequency.

Preschool Ministry: Aubrey Rathke, our DCE intern, has done a great job engaging with our preschool students this year. This year we offered Ashes to our students at Ash Wednesday chapel and Aubrey and I sent communication to classrooms and parents to help them appreciate the death and resurrection symbolized in Ash Wednesday at a Preschool level.

MSY: MSY exists to awaken students to their identity in Christ and empower them to participate in the community of faith. Annalisa and Aubrey have continued to lead this group to discuss biblical principles rooted in their identity as children of God to these students. In April they look forward to joining the High School Youth for their Spring Family work day.

With the retirement of Pastor Arp, Pastor Culbertson is the new Pastoral liaison to the Elders of St. Luke's. We welcome him and look forward to working with him as we continue to serve our Church membership and continue to grow our Lead Elder program for each individual service.

In **January**, the School Board received a briefing from Superintendent Jackson on the Genesis Project. The final report from the consultant is due to us soon. Superintendent Jackson also provided the board with an overview of the re-accreditation process which begins this year and culminates in an accreditation validation team visit in the spring of 2026. The board also reviewed and ratified existing policies on enrollment and evaluation of professional staff.

In **February**, the School Board received, reviewed, and discussed a summary of the recently completed Genesis Project report. This report will also be reviewed by the Board of Directors. The School Board will be using this report as they begin a process to address possible school expansion.

In **March**, the School Board received updates from Superintendent Jackson on the following topics:

- Elevator repair and the facility maintenance escrow fund.
- Middle school servant day and the Florida-Georgia music festival
- Genesis Project initiative on possible school expansion

The board also reviewed and ratified existing policies on faculty, staff, and administration contracts and calls and graduation requirements.

Board for Worship Debbie Cecchetti

January 2025: Members discussed the needs for upcoming worship services in January and reviewed the Advent and Christmas worship services to make note of areas particularly well done and areas for which we could add improvements or enhancements. It was discussed to better label the Christmas Eve services at 3:00 and 4:30 as "family services" rather than children's services and the 6:00 Fuel service as praise band led. The members discussed issues with the handheld advent candles and decided to buy new holders, rather than continuing to recycle them. Steve Cecchetti thanked the Christmas decorating team for the wonderful job in making the worship areas so inviting and celebratory. Eric stated he was delighted with the music throughout the Advent and Christmas season and was very appreciative of all the musicians. He reported that the organ construction began, and that installation is anticipated in 6 to 7 months. Pastor Tige reported that the organ building fund has been growing and that he plans to reach out to individuals for further contributions. Discussions were held regarding the implementation of family acolytes for the 9:30 sanctuary service. Members volunteered to serve the first six weeks to introduce the program, and Pastors would make announcements after services to encourage congregation members to volunteer and serve. Pastor Tige reported the sermon series for the Epiphany season is "Renew Me, O Eternal Light." He also shared that March 2nd we will observe Transfiguration Sunday and Pastor Arp's retirement. The 11:00 sanctuary and Fuel Service will be combined in the sanctuary, and we will celebrate Pastor Arp's service following the 11:00 service, followed by a reception in the large gym.

February 2025: Members discussed the needs for upcoming worship services in February, Transfiguration Sunday and Ash Wednesday. In order to involve more congregation members in the worship service, the communion set up for the Generations service has been changed to accommodate a communion assistant. Nikki Peters reported that the Concert Series concerts continue to be well attended. Pastor Elliott reported the Worship Team is planning to encourage people to wear name tags and to order the same if they do not yet have one. He also stated that he would like to have special music periodically at the new worship space for the Haven worship services. He noted that new broadcasting equipment is being installed at the Haven which will incorporate emergency broadcasting announcements.

<u>March 2025:</u> Members discussed the needs for upcoming worship services in March and midweek Lenten services. Final preparations were discussed for Ash Wednesday services. Paul Heintzen reported that the tech team has prepared a generic slide for the sanctuary screens for weddings. Jane Reed reported she has created new banners for the Lenten seasons and for Palm Sunday. Eric reported that all music ensembles are working on music for Holy Week and Easter. Rob Bursch reported he has updated the usher roster to reflect those currently serving and he will forward changes to Nikki when changes occur. Members discussed the family acolyte program and ways in which to encourage further participation. Pastor Elliott noted that Rev. Dr. Kuhn's memorial service is scheduled for March 14th and that invitations have been extended to District and Synod Pastors.

With the blessing of St Luke's Board, Pastor Tige has stepped down as the President (Corporate Manager) of Goods & Grace and Pastor Scott Coerber has been appointed to this position.

Goods and Grace has moved away from purchasing inventory from Wal Mart and is now ordering from a wholesale grocer that has a very large selection of items to choose from and they deliver to us. This allows the store to continue to offer many items at savings to the ALICE population and we now break even on each sale.

SCHOOL BUDGET ASSUMPTIONS

Income

- Enrollment is budgeted for K to 8 at 634 students and for 2024/2025 we have 633 students. Due to rising costs we have increased tuition for next year by 8%. As a reminder, a large portion of tuition is paid for by the Step Up Scholarship for most of our students and we also offer financial aid to families in need.
- Enrollment is budgeted for Preschool at 243 students and for 2024/2025 we have 246 students.

Educational Expenses

- We have experienced cost increases in this category as follows:
 - Field trip costs have increased. Due to not being able to find certified bus drivers we have started to contract with bus companies to provide transportation, which is costly.
 - As we have added more students, curriculum expenses have risen.
 - Many other costs have risen as well and some costs are offset but revenue increases such as summer camp.

Administrative Expenses

- Costs have increased for our police detail and for our audit.

Plant Operations Expenses

Costs have increased for utilities, insurance, cleaning service and maintenance contracts.

Payroll Expenses

- We are suggesting an overall increase in pay of 3%, in line with the national cost of living increase during the past year.
- We are budgeting a 6% increase in health insurance costs and retirement expenses are being increased for the next several years by Concordia Plan Services.

CHURCH BUDGET ASSUMPTIONS

Income

- Offerings have decreased by \$182k from this time last year. We hope this will turn around soon, but for budget purposes we have decided to be cautious and are budgeting \$3,050,000 for offerings, which is \$205k less than our 24/25 budget.

Maintenance Expenses

- Costs have increased for insurance, and we are planning on increasing what we spend on professional fees as we look at our master plan for land and buildings.

Spiritual Formation Expenses

- This budget is increasing by \$18k for the year due to more participation in youth groups.

Payroll Expenses

- We are suggesting an overall increase in pay of 3%, in line with the national cost of living increase during the past year.
- We are budgeting a 6% increase in health insurance costs and retirement expenses are being increased for the next several years by Concordia Plan Services.
- The church payroll budget is less than 2024/2025 due to retirements and reorganization of duties.
